

Medford sits in that part of Suffolk County that rewards people who slow down long enough to notice it. It is not a place that tries to announce itself with spectacle, and that is part of its appeal. The roads are busy enough, the shopping convenient enough, the parks and nearby preserves close enough, but the best parts of Medford are often the ones people discover gradually, through routine.
