Typical Window Problems and Solutions

Windows sustain extreme temperature variations, wind, rain, and UV exposure daily. Consequently, they provide an unique set of maintenance difficulties.

1. Drafty Windows

If you feel a chill near your windows even when they are shut tight, the weatherstripping or caulking has actually likely weakened.

- **The Fix:** Remove old, fragile caulk around the exterior frame and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone. Change damaged foam or vinyl weatherstripping along the sash tracks.

2. Foggy Glass (Failed Insulated Units)

Modern double- or triple-pane windows feature a sealed gas layer for insulation. When the seal fails, condensation types *in between* the panes, developing an irreversible haze.

- **The Fix:** In most cases, the insulated glass unit (IGU) need to be changed rather than the whole window frame. An expert glazier can easily switch out the glass pane.

3. Stuck Windows

Paint accumulation, distorted wooden frames, or dirt in the tracks can trigger windows to jam.

- **The Fix:** Thoroughly clean the tracks and use a silicone-based lube. If the wood has swollen due to humidity, mindful sanding may be needed when the wood dries.

Typical Door Problems and Solutions

Doors experience mechanical stress from continuous opening, closing, slamming, and twisting.

1. Squeaky or Sagging Hinges

Gradually, the weight of a heavy door pulls on the hinge screws, causing the door to droop and scrape against the floor or frame.

- **The Fix:** Tighten loose screw holes by changing brief screws with longer ones that reach into the sturdy wall stud. For squeaks, use a couple of drops of lightweight device oil or silicone spray to the hinge pins.

2. Damaged Door Jambs and Wood Rot

Outside doors exposed to heavy rain often struggle with wood rot at the bottom of the jambs and threshold.

- **The Fix:** For minor rot, scrape away the decayed wood, treat the location with a wood hardener, and fill it with outside wood epoxy. If the rot is comprehensive, the entire jamb assembly need to be replaced.

3. Faulty Latches and Locks

If a door refuses to remain latched, the strike plate on the frame is most likely misaligned with the latch bolt.

- **The Fix:** Unscrew the strike plate and utilize a file to increase the size of the hole, or reposition the plate a little up or to line up perfectly with the latch.

Repair vs. Replacement: Making the Right Call

Not every issue needs a new installation. Utilize the following guide to identify whether to repair or change your components.

Part Minor Issue (Repair)	Severe Issue (Replace)
Windows Breezy seals, damaged latches, peeling paint	Rot-gutted frames, broken structural glass, extreme warping
Doors Squeaky hinges, misaligned locks, peeling surface	Splintered wood, hollow-core damage, shattered glass panels
