1. Validate Integrity of Game Files

3. Clear Launch Options

While custom-made launch alternatives (like `-novid` or `-high`) can increase performance, outdated commands can contravene video game updates and cause instantaneous crashes upon startup.

- **How to clear them:**
 1. Go to Steam Library -> > Right-click **CS: GO** -> > **Properties**.
 2. Under the **General** tab, try to find the **Launch Options** text box.
 3. Clear out all commands, or strip them down to the bare fundamentals (e.g., `-novid`).

4. Run the Game as Administrator

5. Look for Overheating and Hardware Instability

High frame rates push hardware to its limits. If elements run too hot, thermal throttling or emergency shutdowns will occur.

- Download hardware tracking software like **HWMonitor** or **MSI Afterburner**.
- Keep an eye on CPU and GPU temperature levels while playing. Temperatures regularly above 85 ° C (185 ° F) show poor ventilation, dust buildup, or stopping working thermal paste.
- If the PC is overclocked (by means of XMP/EXPO for RAM or manual CPU/GPU clocks), revert to default speeds to test if stability returns.

Advanced Fixes for Persistent Crashes

If the fundamental actions haven't resolved the issue, it's time to look deeper into system files and background software.

- **Disable Fullscreen Optimizations:** Windows attempts to enhance borderless windowed and fullscreen modes, which can cause micro-stutters and crashes. Right-click `csgo.exe`, go to *Compatibility*, and examine

- **Perform a Clean Reinstall:** Sometimes files are too damaged for an easy confirmation. Totally uninstall the game, by hand delete the leftover Counter-Strike Global Offensive folder in the Steam directory site, and download a fresh copy.
- **Check Virtual Memory (Pagefile):** If Windows lacks RAM, it uses storage area as virtual memory. Ensure the pagefile is set to "System Managed" on your primary SSD.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Q1: Can third-party faceit or matchmaking clients cause CS: GO to crash?

A: Yes. Overlay software, third-party anti-cheats (like FACEIT AC), and recording software application (like Discord Overlay or GeForce Experience ShadowPlay) can hook into the game engine and cause conflicts. Try disabling all overlays if experiencing random crashes.

Q2: Why does my game crash particularly when filling into a map?

A: Crashing during the loading screen normally points to corrupted workshop maps, audio motorist conflicts, or lacking RAM/VRAM. Decreasing your texture settings or unsubscribing from custom-made workshop maps frequently repairs this specific concern.
