1. Camouflage Skins

- **Forest Biome:** Woodland, Forest Raider, and Ranger sets.
- **Desert Biome:** Desert Raiders and Sandstorm sets.

2. Pay-to-Win Iron Sights

Some weapon skins change the physical geometry of the weapon's iron sights, making target acquisition significantly easier.

- **The "Glory" AK-47:** Known for its clean, open iron sights.
- **The "From Hell" MP5:** Features a streamlined front sight post that blocks less of the target.
- **The "Alien Artifact" SMG:** Offers a futuristic, glowing sight image that many gamers prefer over the default design.

Popular Rust Skin Categories

To help organize the countless offered skins, items are generally organized into thematic collections or sets. Some of the most iconic skin sets in *Rust* history consist of:

- **The Tempered Set:** Featuring a metallic, oil-slick, iridescent sheen that shifts colors in the light. Items like the Tempered AK and Tempered Mask are ageless classics.

Tips for Buying and Trading Rust Skins

- **Be careful of Scams:** If you trade beyond the Steam Community Market, use reliable third-party marketplaces and never click suspicious login links.
- **Prioritize Utility First:** If you are on a budget plan, invest in radiant storage boxes (large wooden boxes) and doors initially. These drastically improve your lifestyle inside your base, particularly throughout night cycles.
