The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most fascinating elements of CS: GO skins is that no 2 identical weapons look exactly the very same. Every weapon is appointed a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear value is permanently locked to the product when it is generated and does not degrade further through usage.

The Five Exterior Conditions:

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Pristine, flawless finish with very little to no scratches.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Small acnes or small scuffs, usually just visible upon close assessment.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Noticeable wear and scratches, balancing cost and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Substantial paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.

5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly degraded, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or almost totally removed of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the famous AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states remarkably uncommon and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions runs likewise to a real-world stock market. Prices are determined simply by supply and need, influenced by a number of key elements:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports expert starts utilizing a specific skin throughout a significant tournament, the demand for that item typically increases overnight.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping certain older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins consisted of within them-- decreases, causing rates to rise naturally gradually.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next greater tier, burning products out of flow and completely modifying supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations introduce new thematic collections, briefly flooding or shifting the focus of the marketplace.

Popular Weapon Families to Collect

For players looking to begin a collection, specific weapon families have actually achieved legendary status within the neighborhood due to their creative style and status.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly identifiable by its sci-fi, white, black, and intense orange geometric visual. Offered on the M4A4, AWP, P90, and P250.
