- **Set rigorous monetary limitations:** Treat gambling purely as a kind of home entertainment with a fixed budget plan, instead of a trusted way to generate income.
- **Safeguard your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never log into your Steam account on unverified third-party domains.
