The Regulatory and Legal Landscape

Valve's Crackdown

In 2016, Valve released formal cease-and-desist letters to lots of significant skin gambling sites, specifying that these platforms were breaching the Steam Subscriber Agreement by utilizing OpenID and industrial APIs for industrial gambling purposes.
