Tactical Advantages: P2W (Pay-to-Win) in Rust?

While Facepunch strictly prohibits pay-to-win mechanics that change damage or health, particular skins supply indisputable *tactical* advantages. These items often border on a gray area, regularly causing community debates.

- **Night Visibility:** Glowing iron sights on weapons allow players to aim properly in pitch-black environments without requiring a flashlight attachment, which would otherwise provide away their position.
- **The "P2W" Snow Gear:** Certain clothing skins mix seamlessly into snow biomes, making the user nearly invisible to enemies scanning the horizon from a distance.
- **Transparent Doors:** In the past, particular glass or wire-mesh door skins inadvertently allowed players to check out them before patches fixed the transparency problems, showing how fragile the balance of cosmetic style can be.
