

Hollywood, Florida is one of those cities that gets filed away too quickly by outsiders. People hear “South Florida” and picture the obvious names, then drive right past a place that has managed to keep a distinct personality despite decades of growth, development, and coastal pressure. Hollywood has beaches, yes, but it also has neighborhoods with real texture, a walkable downtown that feels lived in rather than staged, and a history that explains a lot about why the city still feels more approachable than some of its flashier neighbors.

The city’s growth was shaped by the same forces that transformed much of the coast: rail access, land booms, storms, migration, and the slow accumulation of neighborhoods built in different eras. Early Hollywood was smaller and quieter, then postwar suburban expansion pushed it outward. As Broward County filled in, the city became more layered.
