The Float Value System

Aside from rarity, every skin is designated a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00. This float determines the wear condition of the weapon. Even 2 similar skins might look significantly different depending on their float value, which directly affects their market price.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, no scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor blemishes or scratches)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear on paint)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily broken down, sometimes alters the appearance totally)

2. The Mechanics of Acquisition: How Players Get Skins

Gamers have a couple of distinct techniques for constructing their digital inventories. Some rely on large luck, while others prefer direct purchasing.



- **Random Drops:** Simply using official or community servers grants weekly care packages consisting of weapon drops or graffiti.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can acquire or make weapon cases and utilize a corresponding "Key" to unlock them. This runs similarly to a lottery game, with low chances of unboxing high-tier items.
- **The Steam Community Market:** The most safe and most controlled peer-to-peer market for buying and offering skins using Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Trading Sites:** External platforms enable users to buy, sell, or trade skins for real-world currency or crypto, often with lower charges and more liquidity than Steam.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** A feature that enables gamers to trade ten skins of the very same rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier, providing a way to recycle unwanted products.

3. The Digital Economy: Why Do Virtual Items Cost A Lot?

To outsiders, paying hundreds or countless dollars for a virtual knife or rifle skin seems unreasonable. Nevertheless, the financial concepts of supply and demand heavily govern the CS: GO skin market.

Aspects Driving Value:

1. **Scarcity:** Older cases (like the *Operation Bravo Case*) are no longer dropping naturally. As more cases are opened and items are locked into inactive accounts, the supply shrinks while demand continues.

When Valve transitioned the video game from CS: GO to **Counter-Strike 2**, fans held their collective breath relating to the fate of their stocks. Luckily, Valve validated that **all products rollovered effortlessly** into the new engine.

In addition, the visual overhaul brought by the Source 2 engine-- including dynamic lighting, upgraded smoke interactions, and physical-based rendering-- really made lots of timeless skins look substantially more vibrant and in-depth. Surfaces that looked dull in CS: GO got brand-new life and reflection homes in CS2, revitalizing interest in the skin market.
