A virtual coin flip chooses the winner of the entire pot. 50/50 chances (minus site rake). **Jackpot** Multiple gamers contribute skins to a main pot. The more a gamer contributes, the higher their visual percentage opportunity of winning the entire pot. Probability-based; larger factors have better chances but run the risk of more.

How Transactions Work: Deposits and Withdrawals

The Deposit Process
