Pennsylvania's freeze-thaw cycle adds another layer. January and February bring pipe freeze risk, while March often produces ground movement and basement water intrusion. Clay-heavy subsoil across portions of Newtown, Warrington, Richboro, and Lower Makefield can shift enough to stress sewer lines, especially where older clay tile or cast iron laterals remain underground. Roughly 80% of regional homes have full or partial basements, making sump pump reliability more than a convenience.

Drain problems require the same discipline. **Hydro-jetting is a professional drain cleaning method that uses high-pressure water, often 3,000 to 4,000 PSI, to scour grease, scale, sludge, and roots from pipe walls.** Used correctly after video inspection, it can restore flow through a sewer line without unnecessary excavation. Used blindly, it can damage fragile pipe. That distinction separates trained professionals from technicians who treat every clog the same way.
