2. Wear Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is appointed a Float [CSGO Gambling](#) Value varying from 0.00 to 1.00, which determines its physical wear and tear. This system guarantees that no 2 skins look totally similar.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, minimal scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight blemishes, minor wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint missing in crucial areas)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily deteriorated, sometimes altering the skin's look completely)

Note: Some skins are "capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions extremely unusual and important.
