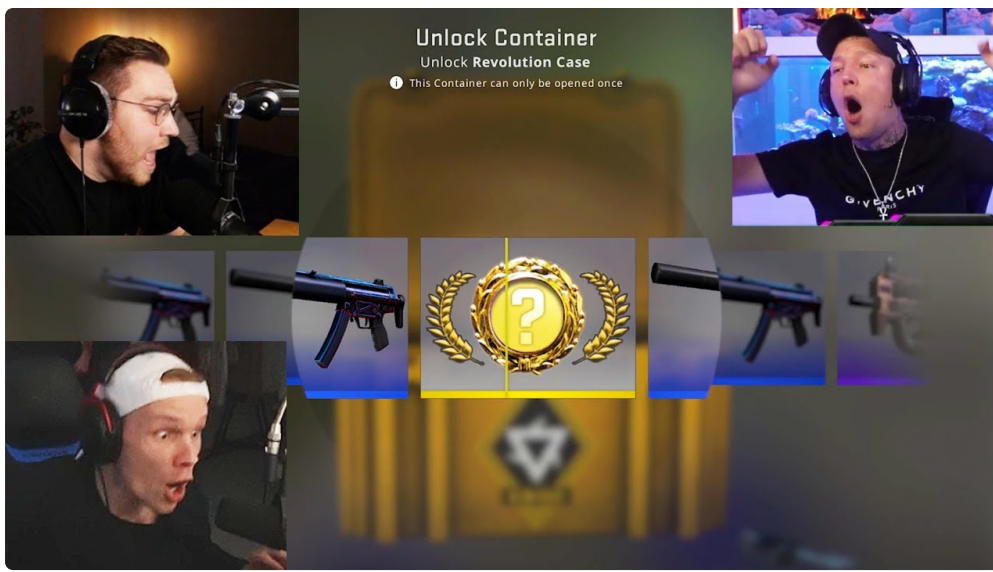

4. Payout The winner is stated, and all products from both swimming pools are moved to the winner's site inventory. **Winner!** Receives products worth £ 22.90 total. **Loser.** Gets nothing.

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

- **Free-For-All (FFA):** Four players get in, but just one wins the whole loot stack.
