And after you ask why they went, the answers sound like previous virtues dressed in new boots: accountability, teammates, a promise to the human being on their left and appropriate.

Lately I hear a various sound in the background, a friction that wasn't as loud twenty years ago. Arguments about symbols outweigh quiet conversations approximately carrier. Memorial Day ads drown out the faucets at nearby cemeteries. We business slogans like they bring equal weight to sacrifice. Maybe which is the genuine question beneath such a lot of floor debates: are we holding faith with the useless, or are we getting lazy with our gratitude?
