- **Trade Hold Updates:** To curb instant trading and cash laundering, Valve presented a compulsory 7-day trade hang on any traded skin. While this temporarily interrupted the gambling market, operators quickly adjusted utilizing P2P systems and crypto cash-outs.
- **Legal Scrutiny:** Governments worldwide have actually started taking notice. Class-action lawsuits, federal government investigations, and statutory restrictions in various countries have actually forced operators to continuously shift domains and legal structures.
