

An attic can influence indoor comfort because it separates conditioned rooms from a space exposed to substantial roof heat. Before adding insulation, however, the attic should be evaluated for more than the amount of material already present.

Access is the first practical issue. The contractor needs enough room to inspect the existing insulation and locate penetrations, mechanical equipment, wiring, recessed fixtures, vents, and other features that may affect the work. Areas hidden by stored belongings or debris can make a complete assessment difficult.

Existing conditions matter as well. Roof leaks, staining, damaged material, pest activity, or ventilation concerns should be identified before new insulation covers the area. Insulation is not a substitute for repairing an active water source or correcting another building problem.

The proposed insulation boundary should be clear. Depending on the building design, insulation may be [Supreme Spray Foam LV projects](#) planned at the attic floor or along another part of the roof assembly. These approaches should not be mixed casually because they can change how the attic interacts with the rest of the building.

Property owners should ask which spray foam product is being considered, how the application surface will be prepared, what thickness is proposed, and how vents and equipment will be handled. They should also ask about access restrictions and reentry instructions during installation and curing.
