Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no visible scratches or use. Normally commands the greatest rate.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small blemishes, slight scratches, or minor paint cracking, frequently just noticeable upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Visible wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Significant wear, heavy scratches, and noteworthy paint loss around the edges and high-friction locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Very worn, heavily faded, and often significantly modified look. Some collectors particularly look for severe BS floats for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise include a **StatTrak**™ technology module, which tracks the variety of kills a player gets with that specific weapon, adding a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic products in numerous other modern-day computer game, CS2 skins have real-world monetary value since they are fully tradeable and marketable. Gamers can purchase, sell, and trade products via the Steam Community Market or through credible third-party marketplaces using genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.
