Consumer Grade (White)	0.00%	N/A (Found in drops, not cases)
Mil-Spec (Blue)	79.92%	Standard base weapon skins
Restricted (Purple)	15.98%	Uncommon weapon skins
Categorized (Pink)	3.20%	Rare weapon skins
Covert (Red)	0.64%	Ultra-rare weapon skins
Unique Rare (Gold)	0.26%	Knives or Special Gloves

Keep in mind: Within each tier above Mil-Spec, there is a roughly 10% chance that the product dropped will remain in "StatTrak" condition, a function that tracks the variety of kills made with that particular weapon.

Comprehending Wear and Float Values

Unpacking a skin is just half the fight. Every weapon dropped from a case is appointed a **Float Value**-- a decimal number varying from 0.00 to 1.00 that identifies the physical wear and tear on the texture.

The wear conditions are categorized into five unique tiers:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00

Some skins look beautiful even in Field-Tested condition, while others look heavily damaged. Certain high-tier collectors actively seek out incredibly high float worths (close to 1.00) for novelty, or exceptionally low floats (close to 0.00) for excellence, dramatically increasing market prices.

The CS: GO Case Economy and Supply Mechanics

The economy surrounding cases operates on supply and need principles comparable to the real stock exchange.

How Supply Decreases Over Time

As Counter-Strike has developed, Valve has actually changed how cases are dropped. Cases are usually divided into active drop pools and unusual (or ceased) drop swimming pools.

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases presently dropped to gamers actively playing weekly matches. Supply is high, and rates typically hover between £ 0.03 and £ 0.50.
- **Rare Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop frequently. Since the total supply of these cases decreases each time one is opened, their market value can increase with time, often reaching dozens or hundreds of dollars per single case.

Tips for Navigating the marketplace

Whether you are a casual player wanting to personalize your loadout or a trader seeking to invest, keep these finest practices in mind:

- **Never deal with case opening as an investment:** Statistically, the anticipated monetary return of opening a case is significantly lower than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret. Many unboxed items deserve just a couple of cents.
