- **Float Values and Wear:** Every skin is assigned a float value ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, determining its condition (Factory New, Minimal Wear, Field-Tested, Well-Worn, and Battle-Scarred).
- **The Trade-Up Contract:** Players can trade ten skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier, supplying a secondary usage for undesirable, low-tier case drops.

How do I get cases free of charge?

Players can earn passive case drops just by using authorities or neighborhood servers with VAC secured. Weekly care plans typically enable gamers to pick specific items, consisting of active-pool weapon cases, just by leveling up their profile as soon as weekly.
