

Boise rewards curious visitors. It has the easy pace people expect from a western capital city, but it also carries a history and personality that show up in the details, a Basque lunch downtown, a street mural tucked off a side block, a river path full of cyclists at dusk, a winter foothill trail with enough snow for quiet, not crowds. The city feels manageable on a first visit, yet it opens up in layers the longer you stay.

Treefort Music Fest is one of the best-known events, and it matters because it captures something true about Boise. It is not only a music festival. The Boise River and the Greenbelt also host a quieter kind of event cycle that is no less important.
