The Step-by-Step DIY Window and Door Tune-Up

1. Inspect and Replace Weatherstripping

In time, weatherstripping compresses and loses its bounce.

- **How to repair:** Peel away the old material, clean the channel with rubbing alcohol, and push brand-new self-adhesive V-strip or foam tape into location.

2. Oil Moving Parts

Squeaky hinges and persistent moving tracks just require a little lubrication.

- **How to repair:** Avoid sticky oils like WD-40 on tracks, as they attract dust and dirt. Rather, use a silicone-based spray or graphite powder on tracks, hinges, and lock mechanisms to make sure smooth operation.

3. Caulk Gaps Around Frames

Exterior gaps let water permeate into walls, triggering structural damage.

- **How to fix:** Scrape away old, cracked exterior caulk. Apply a bead of high-grade, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a wet finger or caulking tool.

4. Adjust Door Hinges

Drooping doors typically have loose screws or a hinge that needs stress modification.

- **How to fix:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are stripped, get rid of the screw, insert a little piece of wood toothpick coated in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.

When to Call the Professionals

While DIY fixes work marvels for minor wear and tear, certain situations require professional intervention. Homeowner need to seek professional aid when:

- **Working with Structural Changes:** Enlarging an opening or replacing a load-bearing door frame requires woodworking knowledge and structure licenses.
