4. **Accessories Lose Power:** The control panel lights, radio, or a/c flicker or stop working to switch on when the key is turned to the "accessory" position.
5. **Key Gets Stuck:** Once the car is turned off, the key can not be eliminated from the ignition cylinder.
6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels abnormally hot to the touch after driving, indicating an electrical brief.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the lorry in Park (or Neutral for manuals)** and engage the emergency situation brake.
2. **Call a mobile automotive locksmith** instantly.
3. **Keep the broken pieces** of the key. The locksmith can utilize these fragments to cut a new key on the area utilizing specialized machinery.

- **Avoid Forcing the Key:** If the key doesn't turn, never ever force it or wiggle it strongly. This can snap the key or break the internal pins.
- **Keep It Clean:** Avoid getting dirt, sand, or sticky liquids inside the ignition slot.
