In a 1960s ranch in Warminster or a split-level in Horsham, duct systems were often designed before today's airflow expectations and indoor air quality upgrades.

MERV rating — the measurement of how effectively an HVAC filter captures airborne particles — also matters. Higher MERV filters can trap more allergens and dust, but some older blowers cannot handle the added resistance. Thermostat issues deserve equal scrutiny.
