5. **Valve's Crackdown:** Valve, the developer of Counter-Strike, has consistently upgraded its API and trade policies to suppress gambling. Mass bans of trading bots and accounts related to gambling sites have actually erased millions of dollars in digital possessions overnight.

How Valve and Regulators Responded

The relationship between Valve and the skin gambling market has been a constant video game of cat and mouse.

- **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Following a huge class-action suit and public outcry over unregulated small gambling, Valve issued formal cease-and-desist letters to lots of significant skin gambling sites, forcing lots of to briefly shut down.
- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To slow down the fast blood circulation of stolen and gambling-bound products, Valve introduced a **7-day trade hold** on all traded skins. This meant gamers could no longer immediately deposit and withdraw items, dealing a substantial blow to hectic gambling sites.
- **P2P Marketplaces:** In action to API limitations, gambling sites developed by embracing Peer-to-Peer (P2P) systems, where items are traded directly in between gamers rather than through automated site bots.

In spite of these procedures, the industry adjusted, with numerous sites pivoting towards cryptocurrency combination to bypass Steam's trade restrictions completely.
