- **The Active Drop Pool vs. Rare Drop Pool:** When a case is transferred to the "Rare Drop Pool" (terminated active drop), its supply stops increasing naturally. Consequently, as players open them over time, the remaining supply shrinks, and the cost of the case often escalates.
- **Float Values and Wear:** Every skin is appointed a float value ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, determining its condition (Factory New, Minimal Wear, Field-Tested, Well-Worn, and Battle-Scarred).
- **The Trade-Up Contract:** Players can trade 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next higher tier, supplying a secondary use for undesirable, low-tier case drops.
