

A place that lives between regions

Jessup, Maryland, is the kind of place people often pass through before they learn its name. It sits in that practical middle ground between Baltimore, Washington, and the slower, leafier pockets of Howard and Anne Arundel counties. For many visitors, Jessup first appears as a cluster of exits, warehouses, rail lines, and local roads stitched together by commuter traffic and the daily movement of goods.
