Note: Some skins are "capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variations remarkably unusual and valuable.

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

In addition to use, skins can feature unique versions:

- **StatTrak™:** These weapons include a small digital counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates the owner makes with that specific weapon.
- **Memento Packages:** Dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors), these skins come pre-applied with gold stickers representing the teams and map of the particular match.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are categorized into different rarity tiers, which determine how regularly they appear in weapon cases. Understanding these tiers helps players gauge the status and relative worth of an item.

Rarity Tier Color Code Drop Rate/ Acquisition Method **Customer Grade** White Typical drops, base-game weapons. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue A little rarer typical drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Basic tier found in weapon cases. **Limited** Purple Uncommon case pulls. **Categorized** Pink Rare case drops, typically including detailed art work. **Covert** Red Ultra-rare products, normally the flagship weapon of a case. **Unique (Exceedingly Rare)** Gold Knives and gloves; the holy grail of unboxing.
