- **Jackpot:** Multiple players toss skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the total worth of the pot is granted to a single winner, with higher-value products increasing a player's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based game where a gamer chooses a skin they want to win (worth more than their existing skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively update.
