- **Age Restrictions:** These sites require users to be of legal betting age in their respective jurisdictions.
- **The House Always Wins:** Remember that case opening websites are organizations designed to generate a revenue. Treat case battles strictly as a type of paid home entertainment, not as a trustworthy investment or source of income.
