How CS: GO Cases Work

To open a weapon case, a gamer requires 2 things: a specific case and a matching decryption key. Keys are standard and cost a flat £ 2.50 GBP directly from the in-game store. Cases, on the other hand, are random drops earned by using official or neighborhood servers, or they can be purchased directly from the Steam Community Market and third-party trading websites.



When a case is opened, a roulette-style animation plays, biking through numerous weapon finishes before stopping on a single item. The product received is identified entirely by server-side RNG (Random Number Generation) the specific minute the animation begins.

Understanding the Odds and Rarities

One of the most crucial elements of case opening is understanding the probabilities involved. Valve historically kept these chances a secret, however due to regulative modifications in China, they were forced to publish the official drop rates.

Every item inside a case falls under a particular rarity tier, which determines its drop rate and general worth. Additionally, products can drop in among 5 outside conditions, ranging from Factory New to Battle-Scarred, and might occasionally include a rare "StatTrak" module that tracks kills.

The value of a CS: GO skin is not identified by Valve, but rather by the players. A number of crucial financial aspects drive the rate of case drops and weapon finishes:

- **Supply and Demand:** Older cases that no longer drop actively in the game ended up being scarcer with time. As the supply diminishes and more players open them, the staying cases increase in price.
- **Use and Tear (Float Value):** Each weapon has a "float worth" from 0.00 to 1.00. Certain skins look dramatically different (and frequently much better) when they are Factory New, making flawless variations incredibly rare and expensive.
- **Pro Player Popularity:** If a prominent esports expert utilizes a specific skin throughout a Major competition, need for that skin usually escalates over night.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten skins of the exact same rarity for one skin of the next greater tier, producing a stable demand for lower-tier items.
