Over the years, Valve has actually taken several enforcement actions:

1. **The 2016 Cease-and-Desist Era:** Valve sent trade-ban cautions to dozens of prominent skin gambling sites, requiring numerous to momentarily close.
2. **Trade Hold Introductions:** Valve implemented a 7-day trade hang on newly traded products to suppress instant betting turnover.
3. **API and Bot Restrictions:** Valve consistently revokes the API secrets of automated bots utilized by gambling platforms to process deposits and withdrawals.

Regardless of these efforts, operators continuously find technical workarounds, shifting towards decentralized payment models and P2P trading networks that do not depend on direct bot inventories.
