- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) game mode where 2 users wager equivalent quantities of skins or credits. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the whole pot.
- **Jackpot:** Multiple players pool their skins into a single pot. The higher the worth of the skins a user contributes, the higher their percentage chance of winning the whole accumulated pot.

- **Absence of Consumer Protection:** Unlike controlled, land-based casinos or certified online sportsbooks, uncontrolled third-party sites offer little to no legal recourse if a platform shuts down or withholds funds.

Best Practices for Safe Participation
