

Medford sits in a part of Suffolk County that many travelers pass through without really noticing, which is a shame, because the area has a practical kind of charm that rewards people who slow down. It is not a polished resort town, and that is part of the appeal. Medford feels lived-in, useful, and connected to the rhythms of Long Island rather than staged for visitors.
