Rarity Tier Item Classification Approximate Drop Probability **Blue** Mil-Spec Grade ~ 79.92% **Purple** Restricted ~ 15.98% **Pink** Classified ~ 3.20% **Red** Covert ~ 0.64% **Gold/ Special** Knives/ Gloves ~ 0.26%

(Note: Within each tier, there is an extra chance that the product will drop in "StatTrak" condition, an unique function that tracks the variety of eliminates made with that particular weapon.)

As the table clearly shows, the odds of pulling a high-tier product (Red or Gold) are exceptionally low. Statistically, the vast majority of case openings will lead to a Blue-tier item worth substantially less than the £ 2.50 expense of the secret.

The Economics of the Case Marketplace

The worth of a CS: GO case and its contents is completely determined by supply and need. Unlike traditional microtransactions where products have actually a fixed rate, the Steam Community Market functions just like a genuine stock market.
