Key Aspects to Note in a Demo

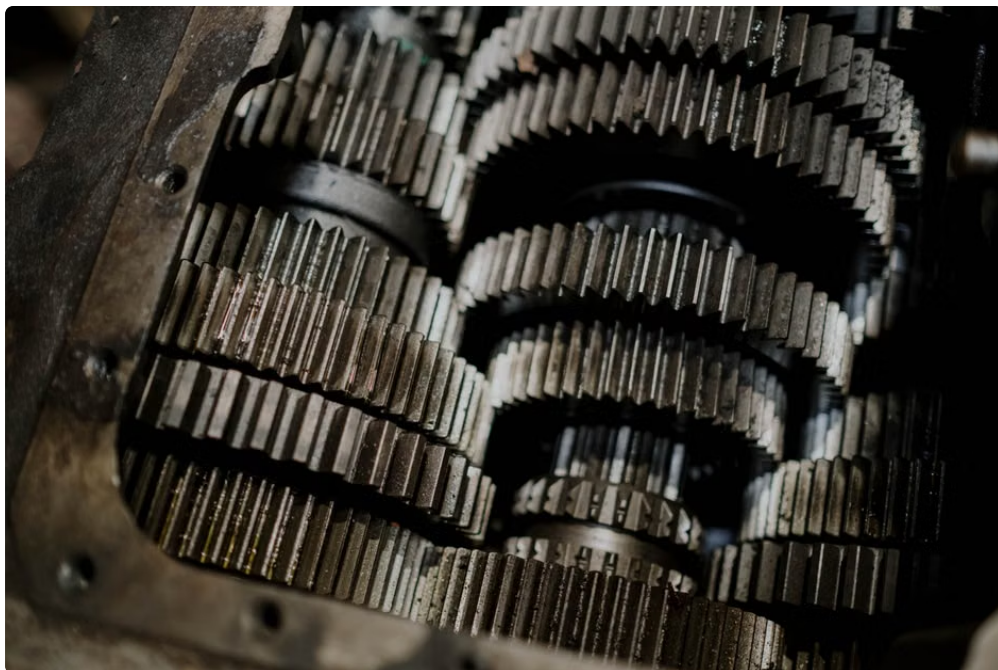
- **Round Length and Flow:** How long does a single round last? For example, slots execute spins quickly, while card games have distinct deals, decisions, and results segments.
