- **Action 3:** Sand or aircraft the high area down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to prevent moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

- **Action 1:** Open the door and place a wedge beneath it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin up utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.

- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by unscrewing it and submitting down the hole, or moving it somewhat up or down to line up with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts indicate abject weatherstripping or stopped working caulking around the window frame.

- **Step 2:** For double-hung windows, change worn-out V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to develop a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

- **Step 1:** Run an energy knife thoroughly around the boundary of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.

- **Action 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and apply a silicone-based lubricant to assist the window move efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the two panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has stopped working. Unfortunately, this typically requires changing the glass unit (IGU) instead of the entire window

frame.
