Well-Worn (WW) | 0.38-- 0.45 | Considerable wear; paint is visibly chipped and dull in major locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS) | 0.45-- 1.00 | Heavy wear. The weapon looks heavily weathered, rusted, or battered. (Note: Some skins look uniquely "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It deserves noting that some skins are hardcoded to never ever appear in certain conditions. For example, a particular skin might just exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are classified into different rarity tiers, which dictate how difficult they are to obtain through random case drops or trade-ups.



- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard weapon finishes.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical than customer grade.
- **Mil-Spec Grade (Dark Blue):** The standard tier for most weapon case drops.
- **Limited (Purple):** Noticeably rarer and often includes more complex artwork.

- **Unique Rare (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. These are the rarest and most expensive standard drops in the game.
