1. Fixing a Sagging Door

- **Step 4:** Test the door. If it still sags, repeat the process on the middle hinge.

2. Removing Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking door is a small annoyance that takes seconds to repair.

- **Step 1:** Avoid utilizing cooking oil or basic home grease, which attracts dust and gums up the mechanism. Rather, use a silicone-based spray, white lithium grease, and even petroleum jelly.
- **Action 2:** Open and close the door a few times to work the lube into the hinge pin.
- **Step 3:** If the squeak continues, tap the hinge pin out using a nail and a hammer, wipe it tidy with a rag, coat it lightly with lube, and tap it back into location.

3. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty doors let conditioned air escape, increasing energy costs. Changing old weatherstripping is a quick, high-impact weekend job.

- **Step 2:** Clean the door jamb thoroughly to eliminate dirt and old adhesive residue.
