The Anatomy of a Finish: What Determines Value?

1. Exterior Wear (Float Value)

Every item drops with a particular "float worth" varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical wear and tear. The float is divided into 5 main wear classifications:



- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight acnes, typically near edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches, or fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint chipping)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely worn, in some cases drastically altering the texture)

Note: Some products look wonderful even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others are valued strictly in Factory New.

2. Product Rarity Tiers

Valve classifies weapon surfaces into color-coded tiers based upon their drop rates in cases or trade-ups.

Rarity Tier Color Code Drop Rate/ Acquisition Method **Customer Grade** White Discovered in weekly drops/ Base game **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Common drops/ Low-tier case contents **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Requirement case

drops **Restricted** Purple Uncommon case drops **Categorized** Pink Unusual case drops **Covert** Red Extremely uncommon case drops (Top-tier basic weapons) **Exotic/ Special** Gold Very unusual (Knives and Gloves)

Patterns and StatTrak™: The Elements of Prestige

Beyond float worths and rarities, 2 significant functions can significantly inflate a product's worth: **Pattern Indexes** and **StatTrak™ innovation**.

Pattern Templates

Lots of finishes utilize a procedural generation system where a texture design template crosses the weapon design based on a "Paint Seed" (from 1 to 1000). Depending on the seed number, the visual look can alter entirely.

- **Case Hardened:** Famous for its blue and gold circulations. A pattern with a high portion of solid blue on top can command tens of thousands of dollars.
- **Fade:** Depending on the seed, the shift from yellow to pink to purple can differ, with "100% Fade" versions bring top dollar.

StatTrak™ Technology

Items geared up with StatTrak™ feature a small digital LCD screen connected to the weapon body that tracks the variety of confirmed eliminates the owner makes with it. While these products drop at the very same rate as their non-StatTrak counterparts, they normally command a higher price on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.

How to Acquire Them

Building a digital stock can be approached through numerous various methods, each carrying its own risks and benefits.

1. **Opening Cases:** The adventure of the gamble. Gamers purchase a weapon case and a corresponding key to unlock a random item. While everyone dreams of unboxing an uncommon knife, the mathematical odds heavily favor the house.

4. **Trade-Ups:** A system where players can trade ten items of one rarity tier for one random product of the next greater tier within the same collection.

Because high-tier products can be worth as much as real-world autos, security is critical. Cybersecurity risks like API rip-offs and phishing links target unskilled traders daily.

- **Never Ever Log Into Unfamiliar Sites:** Always double-check URLs before connecting a Steam account.
