- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully forced popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from using Steam-related facilities.

Regardless of these measures, operators continue to adapt by making use of peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and offshore licensing to keep their platforms running.
