

Tequesta has a way of surprising people.

At first glance, it can seem like one of those quiet coastal towns that sits just a little apart from the rush of South Florida. Then you spend time here, and the place starts revealing its depth. The village has old riverfront roots, a strong sense of neighborhood identity, and the kind of easygoing polish that comes from decades of steady growth rather than abrupt reinvention.
