Popular Forms of CS2 Gambling

Normally, users log into a gambling site using their Steam qualifications. To transfer funds, players transfer CS2 skins from their Steam inventory to a bot controlled by the gambling platform. The site then credits the user's account with internal currency or site coins. When players want to cash out, they use those coins to acquire other skins from the site's bot inventory, which are then traded back to the player's Steam account.
