2. **A Key:** Purchased directly in-game or by means of the Steam Market for a flat rate (usually £ 2.50 GBP).

When opened, the case disappears permanently, and the player is rewarded with a single weapon skin of differing rarity and outside wear.

The Exterior Wear System

Unboxing a skin is just half the battle. Every weapon skin produced from a case is appointed a float value varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical wear condition.

The wear conditions are classified as follows:



- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look beautiful even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others end up being unrecognizable. This includes another layer of RNG (Random Number Generation) to case openings, considerably influencing the market value of the dropped product.

The Economics of the Steam Community Market

The CS: GO economy operates on supply and need, mirroring standard monetary markets. Valve sets the cost of keys, but the prices of cases and skins are completely player-driven.

Key Economic Factors:

- **Active vs. Rare Drop Pools:** Valve regularly turns cases into a "uncommon drop swimming pool," significantly reducing their drop frequency. When a case ends up being rare, its supply diminishes, triggering its cost on the Community Market to increase-- in some cases from a couple of cents to tens of dollars.
- **The "Hype" Factor:** The release of significant game updates, esports competitions (Majors), or the launch of *Counter-Strike 2* traditionally triggers massive spikes in player counts and case openings.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade 10 skins of the very same rarity for 1 skin of the next greater rarity. This mechanic helps control the supply of low-tier skins while incentivizing players to recycle undesirable items.

Popular Cases Through the Years

Over a years, hundreds of cases have been released. Some have actually achieved famous status due to their renowned contents.

- **The Weapon Case (1 & 2):** The pioneers of the system, containing classic knives like the Karambit and M9 Bayonet. These command huge rates today.
- **The Chroma Case Series:** Introduced a few of the most lively and popular knife surfaces in the video game, such as Doppler, Marble Fade, and Tiger Tooth.
- **Prisma Case:** Known for presenting high-tier knife surfaces paired with budget friendly yet popular community-designed weapon skins.

- **Transformation/ Fracture Cases:** Representing modern-day style ages, featuring complex artwork and futuristic weapon looks.

Tips and Best Practices for Enthusiasts

For those who wish to take part in the world of CS: GO cases, keeping a few best practices in mind can avoid unneeded financial loss:

- **Treat It as Entertainment, Not Investment:** Mathematically, the house almost always wins. Statistically, opening cases yields an expected return of significantly less than the expense of the secret.
