- **Prize:** Multiple players throw skins into a typical pot. A lottery-style wheel spins, and the total value of the pot is granted to a single winner, with higher-value products increasing a player's relative share of the wheel.
- **Upgrader:** A risk-based game where a player picks a skin they want to win (worth more than their current skin) and rolls a wheel to see if they effectively upgrade.
