How CSGO Gambling Sites Operate: The Technical Side

Unlike conventional online casinos that utilize fiat currency (GBP, EUR) or cryptocurrencies, CSGO gambling websites rely greatly on **API combination with Steam**.

When a user wishes to deposit or withdraw funds, the procedure usually follows these actions:

1. **Authentication:** The user logs in by means of OpenID through their official Steam account.
2. **Stock Sync:** The site's bot checks out the user's Steam stock to show their available CSGO skins.
3. **Deposit:** The user initiates a trade offer with a designated site bot, moving the skin to the bot's inventory in exchange for site credits.
