Overconfidence and the Curse of Favourites

In a sport revered worldwide and overseen by organisations like **FIFA** and **UEFA**, where billions of euros and millions of hearts are involved, the spotlight often shines brightest on the favourites. Yet this status sometimes works against these teams.

This single upset moment reinforced the sport's reputation for unpredictability at the highest levels.

Historic Upsets in Finals and Knockouts: When Giants Fall

Football's heritage is chock-full of instances where supposedly 'classier' teams crashed out against lesser-known opponents. These matches have shaped not only tournament outcomes but the broader narrative of football unpredictability:

What links these moments is not just the upset but the way momentum shifted dramatically, sometimes after a single trigger — a goal, a red card, even a controversial VAR decision. One thing fans have come to expect in football is that no lead is truly safe.

Momentum Swings and Psychology: The Hidden Forces in Football

Football is as much a mental battle as it is a physical one. As we zoom into single matches, the phenomenon of momentum and psychological effect plays a pivotal role in unpredictability:
