

San Diego is one of those cities that rewards people who slow down and pay attention. On a map, it can look like a clean sweep of coastline, canyons, and neighborhoods. On the ground, it feels more layered than that. These differences matter because they shape how people design and use outdoor spaces. A lot of the city's identity is tied to the idea of living outdoors, but the details vary block by block.
