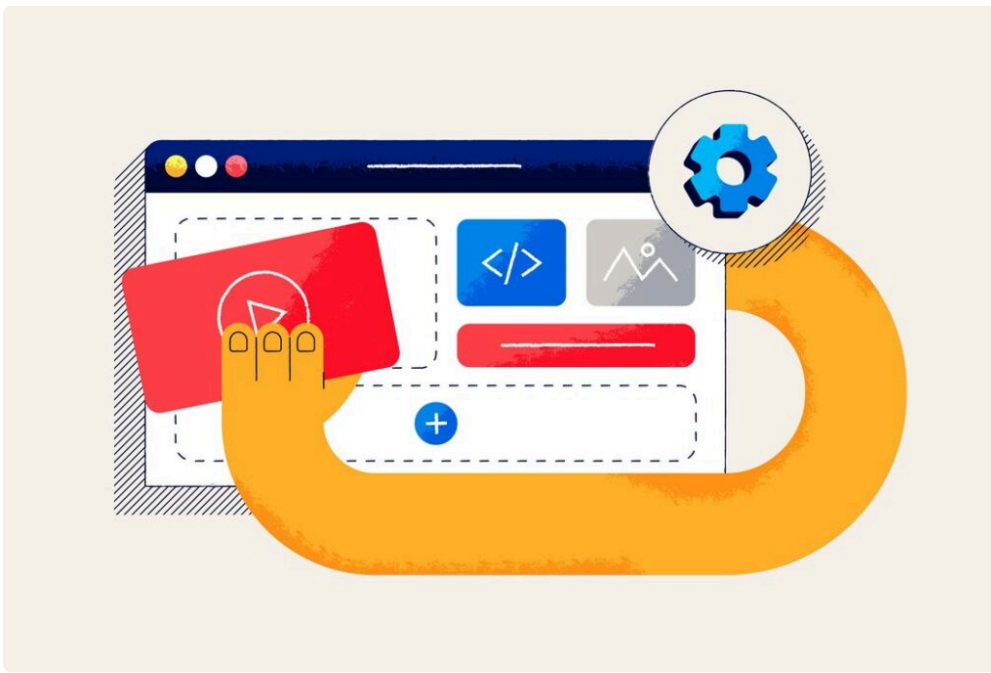
Best Day Excursions Within 15-30 Minutes
