- **Not-Really-DIY:** Many mini splits require line set bending, brazing, vacuuming, and charging that demand professional HVAC licensing. Even when a brand markets a "DIY-friendly" package, local electrical codes and refrigerant handling laws often require licensed installers.

For spring and fall fan-only mode use, the question of DIY capacity is relevant. A true DIY system with quick connect fittings makes it easier to service your system if you notice, for example, that fan-only airflow feels weak or the indoor unit is misaligned for optimal circulation.

Pro tip: Before final installation, use cardboard cutouts the size of your air handler heads to test different wall placements. This way, you can visualize how the airflow direction and visual weight will fit into your decor and not disrupt your gallery walls—remember, anything that covers artwork hangings or creates odd shadowing falls under my pet "things that ruin a gallery wall."

- **Compatibility with existing trim and plaster walls:** Older homes need more careful routing and mounting to preserve charm.
- **Influence on gallery walls:** Avoid placing units or lines in locations that break up collections of photos or artwork; the line set conduit can be disguised, but it's challenging to mask indoor units without losing efficiency.

Long, coiled lines or multiple couplers increase leak risk and negatively affect cooling efficiency. This is especially relevant when using fan-only mode because improper refrigerant flow isn't usually diagnosed by users relying on airflow only.

- **Minimize line length:** Plan your air handler placement to keep line sets short and direct to reduce leak potential.
- **Use quick connect fittings (offered by brands like MRCOOL):** These can simplify connections and reduce the likelihood of leaks when done properly.
- **Avoid unnecessary line coiling:** Excess refrigerant line coiling isn't just bulky—it creates weak points in the system.
